### 2. Key highlights

**Eastern Porirua is a vibrant community** undergoing extensive redevelopment over the next 20 years. Kāinga Ora partnered with Ngāti Toa Rangatira and Porirua City Council to form the large-scale project known as Te Rā Nui, **Eastern Porirua Development. Since** 2019, Te Rā Nui has invested in significant civils work and three water infrastructure upgrades. These will enable the redevelopment of over 2000 social housing homes and the building of 2000 market or affordable homes, along with anticipated improvements to green spaces, facilities and transport.


With significant change happening in eastern Porirua, it's important that we get this right. We will use existing data to help track how Te Rā Nui investments impact a wide range of community outcomes. This Baseline Report measures community indicators from 2013-2024 to show what the community was like before Te Rā Nui started in 2019 and in the early stages of the large-scale project.

The report uses multiple outcome measures because large-scale redevelopment will affect the

community in different ways. The information comes from existing surveys (e.g. Census and Quality of Life), as well as group conversations and a community survey conducted by Kāinga Ora in 2023-2024.

The Key Highlights on pages 6-18 represent only a fraction of the information presented in this report and focus on the desired community outcomes where Te Rā Nui will be able to make a significant contribution through its redevelopment investment. Many other outcomes such as education or transport reported later in this report require multiple government agencies, community groups and other organisations to work together over the next two decades to achieve better outcomes for eastern Porirua.

All information in this report refers to eastern Porirua residents unless otherwise mentioned.

### 3. Report kaupapa

When consulted in 2019, the eastern Porirua community highlighted what they love about their community and their aspirations for it, but they also wanted improvements to housing, infrastructure and environment. These views were reinforced in 2023 through the <a href="Hui Tahi Tatou o Porirua">Hui Tahi Tatou o Porirua</a> community engagement, led by Te Rā Nui.

This Baseline Outcomes Report brings together a wide range of existing and new data sources to show what outcomes looked like in eastern Porirua before Te Rā Nui got underway and in the very early stages of redevelopment. The Report uses an Outcomes Monitoring and Evaluation Framework developed by Kāinga Ora to measure how outcomes change over time as redevelopment progresses. Future Outcome Reports will check progress within the community.


Outcomes are measured across 7 interconnected kete, or outcome areas, illustrated on the next page.

The kumara vine connecting each kete shows their interconnectedness and how the data will be woven together to provide a comprehensive picture of changes in eastern Porirua. How Te Rā Nui will contribute to improving outcomes is indicated at the start of each kete.



### This report draws on information from:



#### **Eastern Porirua Community Survey (2024)**

- Run by Kāinga Ora to better understand community outcomes and provide a baseline for monitoring progress against those outcomes.
- 1,193 participants, with good representation across different neighbourhoods, ethnic groups, and ages. The survey was open to anyone aged 16+ living in Ascot Park, Cannons Creek, Rānui or Waitangirua, as well as people with a strong connection to eastern Porirua (e.g. through family, work or church).
- More than one person per household could take the survey, with 16-20 year olds able to participate in a shorter youth survey.
- Every household in eastern Porirua received postcard information about the survey and Kāinga Ora employed 5 local Community Researchers to promote the survey in communities and at events.



### 9 community talanoa (small group conversations) (2023)

- Run by Kāinga Ora to inform questions in the Eastern Porirua Community Survey
- Involved rangatahi (young people), pāhake (older people) and whaikaha (disabled peoples) because their voices were underrepresented in prior research about eastern Porirua.
- Focused on 'Living Your Best Life in Eastern Porirua', drawing upon the 7 kete/outcome areas found in the Eastern Porirua Outcomes Framework.







- Unless indicated otherwise, all information is for 'eastern Porirua' residents that is, people living in the seven <u>Census Statistical Area 2</u> units that largely match the suburbs that are affected by the Te Rā Nui development or, in the case of the QoL and ARS surveys, the 'Eastern ward' which covers roughly the same suburbs.
- Where possible, eastern Porirua information is compared with that for New Zealand or the 8 cities surveyed by QoL (Porirua, Auckland, Christchurch, Dunedin, Hamilton, Hutt, Tauranga, Wellington).
- Some results in this report come from the Integrated Data Infrastructure (IDI). These results are not official statistics. They have been created for research purposes from the IDI which is carefully managed by Stats NZ. ### 6. A snapshot of eastern Porirua prior to redevelopment

Te Rā Nui focuses on 4 unique suburbs in eastern Porirua:

- Ascot Park
- Waitangirua
- Cannons Creek
- Rānui



In 2018, the 19,794 people who made eastern Porirua their home were more culturally diverse and younger than people in many other places in New Zealand.

### 6. A snapshot of eastern Porirua prior to redevelopment

In 2019, most houses in eastern Porirua were (on average) 50+ years old.

The physical infrastructure in eastern Porirua was also aging, requiring significant investment before new houses could be built:

<u>Community consultation</u> indicated that many homes were cold, unhealthy and not suited to resident needs.

 Flooding was common on arterial roads, with more than 40,000m3 of wastewater overflow each year.





• Water quality was poor in rivers and Porirua Harbour.







• The existing water reservoir could support residents for only two days in an emergency.



### In 2019, community taonga included:

- 14 schools
- 17 early childhood centres
- 10 churches/faith-based centres
- 3 cultural community centres
- Cannons Creek Library
- Cannons Creek Swimming Pool
- Mungavin Hall
- 5 medical & 2 community support services
- Bothamley Park, Cannons Creek Park and Cannons Creek Lake Reserve
- Jerry Collins stadium
- Affordable shops catering for diverse community needs

### Yet <u>community consultation</u> highlighted:

- A lack of affordable local spaces for community groups to use
- Rundown town centres at Cannons Creek and Waitangirua
- Safety and accessibility concerns in parks and streets
- Poor public transport links

### Quality

Nearly *three-fifths* of eastern Porirua residents who took part in the Community Survey said the 'overall quality' of their home was 'very good' or 'good'.

The *highest rating* was for 'connection between your home and nature (e.g. a view of trees)', with just over three-fifths of residents agreeing (indicating 'very good' or 'good').

'Noise from outside (e.g. traffic)' had the *lowest rating;* just over a quarter of eastern Porirua residents said it was 'bad' or 'very bad'.

"I've only selected 'bad' due to the following reasons: my daughter has a disability and is unable to walk properly so we are carrying her up and down the stairs to go to bed/the toilet. In the summer it's too hot upstairs we need to sleep downstairs and in winter it's so cold we're using heaters in every room.

The paint and wallpaper is fading/tearing and carpet isn't the best. There is occasional mould in the bathroom and the paint also chips" (Community Survey 2024).

"Overcrowded, no storage, windows bang, broken latches, borer in the room and cupboards, trees need trimming, door handles need replacing and more" (Community Survey 2024). "It's considered cozy and warm in winter and comfy and cool in summer and neighbours pop in to enjoy the environment" (Community Survey 2024).


"Road noise is very loud. My neighbour is noisier at night" (Community Survey 2024).

"It seems the contractors who finished off the build didn't care and barely paid attention to finishing touches, as well as the plumber had forgotten to connect the shower to an out pipe which led to us moving out only days after moving in" (Community Survey 2024).

### Quality

Around *two-fifths* of eastern Porirua households said they regularly had mould in their homes, *more than double* the proportion of New Zealand households generally.

"The walls always gets wet and I use a dehumidifier. Rooms don't get warm when heat pump is on" (Community Survey 2024).

"Yes when it rains my carpet gets wet and smells, the water lodges under the house nowhere to go, and my bath tub I'm constantly cleaning mould (Community Survey 2024).



### **Suitability – Accessibility**

"... having a ramp built in, like rails so they can hold on to, just making it more accessible for our elderly and our disabled people, instead of having to carry them"

(Rangatahi talanoa 2023).

"Our tenancy manager come along, she took the kitchen door off. She got the builder to take the kitchen door off, so the wheelchair could get in. And I said, 'It's not the door, it's the frame!' [laughing]" (Whaikaha talanoa 2023).

"... [it's] just we don't walk terribly well and we're in a twostoreyed house" (Pāhake talanoa 2023).

"I love my house cause of easy access" (Community Survey 2024).

"I can't even have a shower sometimes. I can't lift my body over" (Whaikaha talanoa 2023).

"... people presume that people with disabilities don't have life. They don't have children. They don't have ... the same responsibilities" (Whaikaha talanoa 2023).


"I can't manage having to climb up the 32 steps to the house now as I have shoulder problems" (Community Survey 2024). "We have adapted our home for disability requirements at our own expense" (Community Survey 2024).

"I'm staying in a disability house. I have been around since 2004. It's not suitable for a disabled person" (Community Survey 2024).

Half of eastern Porirua households were *crowded* (at least 1 extra bedroom needed), *slightly more* than for New Zealand generally.

Between 2013 and 2018, the proportion of eastern Porirua crowded households stayed *steady*, while it *increased* for New Zealand generally.

#### Crowded households (i.e. need least 1 extra bedroom)



"... my family, we're having to find a new house, but most of the houses around here are only two bedrooms, three bedrooms but there's mum, my dad, me, my sister, our partners, my brothers. There's almost 10 of us living in one house and there's only like three bedrooms inside. My brother sleeps in the garage because that's the only space that's available" (Rangatahi talanoa 2023).

In eastern Porirua, crowding (at least 1 extra bedroom needed) decreased by 2% in social housing rental homes, while it increased by 3% in private rental homes between 2013 and 2018.

This differs from New Zealand generally, where crowding *stayed steady* between 2013 and 2018 in social housing rental homes, although it similarly *increased* by 3% in private rental homes.





Over half of Pacific and 'Other' ethnic households in eastern Porirua were crowded (i.e. at least 1 extra bedroom needed), with around two-fifths of Māori and Pākehā households reporting crowded households. Crowding was fairly steady in households from all ethnic groupings between 2013 and 2018.


These trends were similar to those for New Zealand generally, except crowding was around 6-8% *higher* in Pacific and 'Other' households across New Zealand, compared to eastern Porirua, while levels of crowding were the *same* for Māori and *very similar* for New Zealand European/Pākehā households.


#### Crowded households in New Zealand by ethnic group

More than half of eastern Porirua participants reported that people who usually lived in their home regularly used the lounge for sleeping. A *smaller* proportion of households regularly used garages or sleep outs, caravans, cabins for sleeping.

"I sleep in the lounge because my house feels safer there" (Community Survey 2024).

"Myself and my 3 under 10 (all special needs) sleep in the lounge as my big children have the rooms" (Community Survey 2024). "It is too small to cater to my humongous whānau. My brother and daughter are on the waitlist for a [social] housing house. The house is a 3 bedroom house with 5 adults, 2 teenagers and 4 kids under the age of 11" (Community Survey 2024).

"Would love it if it [house] was extended and made bigger to use up the land it's on :) and also for more space for the 8 of us" (Community Survey 2024).

### **Suitability – Cultural appropriateness**

With respect to their current home, over half of eastern Porirua residents thought the amount of indoor space for the amount of people living there and layout was 'very good' or 'good'.

However, many of the open-ended questions in the survey and discussion in talanoa suggested that size and cultural appropriateness were significant issues in eastern Porirua.

"... a matai and leader and a prayer leader [who is in a wheelchair], when someone passes and he can't get in the house, they have to put a tent outside. It's not the same as coming into the body .... And so, we just adapt. I know that. But sometimes it's too cold to put the body outside and the visitors. It's just our houses were designed basically here by an Austrian .... But it was not built for us. And look at our families, how big the people are physically. You have to turn sideways to get into the toilet" (Whaikaha talanoa 2023).

"Not designed for a big family (more than 2 children)" (Community Survey 2024).

"PIC is not open to everybody because it's too busy, but it's the only one of the churches that take bodies, and you can lay them out at the church community hall. But other churches, you keep the body at your house. So, your house is not really made so that you can get the casket in and out the house. You can look at pictures and stuff where windows are taken out just to get the body out of the house" (Whaikaha talanoa 2023).

"Fale tasi, O lo'o fa'afauing lau umukaka ma le fale'ta'ele. Stand alone house. They are building kitchens next to the showers/toilets" (Community survey 2024).

### **Suitability – Cultural appropriateness**

*More* eastern Porirua residents lived in either two- or three+-family households than in New Zealand generally, although the number of 2-family households *declined slightly* between 2013 and 2018.

There were also *fewer* one-person households in eastern Porirua, although the number of one-family households was about the *same* as for New Zealand.

"My house, six people there. Seven, if you come on weekends. And then there's multiple households, where it's multiple generations living together because no one can leave and live on their own because they can't afford that, so they have to go back home and stay there, like my brothers" (Rangatahi talanoa 2023).

"There's currently 3 generations living here (used to be 4 generations, but grandma passed away)"


"House is quite expensive but compared to other like properties, it's very good for our multi-generation family of 3. We are grateful to be living where we do, close to work and kura" (Community Survey 2024).

### Affordability and choice

A *third* of eastern Porirua renter households spent more than 30% of their household income on rent in 2018, *slightly lower* than the almost two-fifths of New Zealand renter households spending more than 30% of income on rent.

Eastern Porirua also had *fewer* renter households spending more than 40% and more than 50% of their income on rent, but *moved closer to the New Zealand average* between 2013 and 2018 because those living in unaffordable housing *increased more* in eastern Porirua than for New Zealand generally.


### Affordability and choice

In both eastern Porirua and New Zealand generally, a *greater* proportion of private rental households spent more than 30% of household income on rent than those living in social housing rental homes in 2013 and 2018, although this proportion *declined slightly* in eastern Porirua.

In contrast, the proportion of social housing rental households spending more than 30% of income on rent *increased more* (by 7% in eastern Porirua) between 2013 and 2018 compared to New Zealand generally (1% increase).

"We can only afford to live here because we have had the same landlord for 10+ years and agree to lower rent in exchange for not expecting house to be up to code" (Community Survey 2024).


In both 2013 and 2018, renters of all ethnic groups in eastern Porirua were *less likely* than the same groups of renters in New Zealand generally to spend more than 30% of household income on rent.

However, all ethnic groups in eastern Porirua except 'Other' moved closer to their respective group's New Zealand rate by 2018, because the proportion of all ethnic groups spending more than 30% of household income on rent increased more in eastern Porirua than in New Zealand generally.

In particular, the number of Māori households in eastern Porirua spending more than 30% of income *increased* by 8% and New Zealand European/Pākehā by 7%, while Pacific peoples increased by 1% and 'Other' *decreased* by 8%.

"It's a suitable home especially for families that have 4+ within the home. Unfortunately there is no opportunity to rent to purchase the home as per the previous HNZ scheme available for low income families" (Community Survey 2024).

Individual homeownership (where individuals own or partly own the home they live in or hold it in a family trust) is less common in eastern Porirua than New Zealand generally. However, Pacific and Asian individuals in eastern Porirua have similar rates of home ownership to others from the same ethnic groups across New Zealand, while Māori and European/Pākehā have much lower rates than individuals from the same ethnic groups.



The proportion of eastern Porirua residents that 'strongly agreed' or 'agreed' their housing costs were affordable was *higher* than for residents of the 8 QoL cities in 2018 but *declined* in comparison. By 2020, eastern Porirua 'agree' responses were *lower* than in the 8 cities and remained *slightly lower* in 2022.

#### Residents that 'strongly agreed' or 'agreed' housing costs were affordable



"It's a great place for a first home buyer, which is the reason why I bought it" (Community Survey 2024).

Fewer residents in eastern Porirua than in the 8 QoL cities 'strongly agreed' or 'agreed' that they lived in homes and a general area/neighbourhood that suited their household's needs. Although the gap has closed from 2018 to 2022, this suggests a lack of choice in the housing market.


# Residents that 'strongly agreed' or 'agreed' their *home* suits their household's needs

"You probably don't need to count my house as it's in Paraparaumu but please note that when I had to move, the private housing was of such a disgusting quality and expensive I couldn't live in Porirua East" (Community Survey 2024).

A minority of community survey participants thought that there was choice in the housing market, in terms of affordability, housing type and intergenerational living.

As a tenant on a moderate income I should be able to live in Eastern Porirua but I don't even have the choice, it is far too expensive. The quality of rentals is very poor (poor nationally but Porirua East is worse). I have to live outside of this area so how does someone on a less income than me but doesn't qualify for Kāinga Ora housing ever manage in Porirua East. They move away from the community (Community Survey 2024).

"... [we] want to have a variation of housing. That we don't simply have a whole row of the similar type boxes or whatever else ..."

(Pāhake talanoa 2023).

"Ou te popole i ave matou i se fale e le talafeagai mo matou. I worry that they'll take me to a house that isn't suitable for our family" (Community Survey 2024).

"... my mum had to move a lot because of the landlord. They keep on like selling houses and telling people to just move ... after how many months of paying rent to then just turn around and be like, 'You've got to get out. Other people paid more money, so you've got to get out'. It's not only just a house for some people, it's a place that holds memories.

# **Stability**

Two-fifths of eastern Porirua residents had lived for more than 15 years in their residence, which was higher than for New Zealanders generally.

"My family came NZ in 1985 as refugees. We have lived in Eastern Porirua since 1988 and Porirua is our home" (Community Survey 2024).

"I am on the Kāinga Ora waiting list for a 1 bedroom home as I am paying \$1160 per fortnight and sometimes have to go without some food items" (Community Survey 2024). "My grandchildren make it the 6th generation to live in Porirua starting with my grandfather who settled in Porirua in the early 1900's" (Community Survey 2024).

### **Physical health**


Slightly fewer eastern Porirua residents rated their physical health as 'very good' or 'good' than residents in the 8 cities, but eastern Porirua reported a slightly smaller decline in physical health than the other cities.

#### Residents reporting 'excellent', 'very good' or 'good' physical health



Residents in eastern Porirua are *less likely* than those in the 8 cities to do regular physical activity, although reported activity *decreased* across all groups in 2020. By 2022, rates returned to the same level as 2018 for the 8 cities but increased by 12% points in eastern Porirua from 2020 to 2022.

"... you can't be a healthy family if you don't have the money for healthy food, you know what I mean" (Rangatahi talanoa 2023).

"I have 3 Bdms 1 of my sons sleeps in kitchen as there is no space, we have mould, my baby and toddler have mould poisoning from being in this home. My baby is constantly sick has had RSV from 2 weeks, my middle son has had Scarlett fever still recovering from Scarlett fever, rheumatic fever we constantly [getting] strep throat from being in too small living house for amount of people" (Community Survey 2024).




# **Physical health**

Across all age groups, a higher proportion of people in eastern Porirua were discharged from publicly-funded hospitals over a 5-year period due to cardiovascular and respiratory conditions than other New Zealanders.



### **Physical health**


Eastern Porirua residents were 1.5-2 times *more likely* to be discharged from an ambulatory sensitive (i.e. preventable) public hospital attendance than other New Zealanders over a 5-year period.

Averaged across all ages over a 5-year period, eastern Porirua had *a similar* rate *of* emergency department attendances at public hospitals compared to other New Zealanders. However, *fewer* eastern Porirua residents aged 0-29 and 75+ attended, while *more* eastern Porirua residents aged 30-74 attended compared to New Zealand generally.



"Health is a major concern, when you think it can't get any worse, it does. What we want to see is that more public health and health promotion programmes are activated to keep people out of the hospital system, this needs to align with the Council district plan and reviewing the requirements for local businesses to provide additional healthy options on top of what appears to be real unhealthy options, we need to be given the options, at the moment there is very little option other than the unhealthy food" (Community Survey 2024).

### Mental and emotional health

A majority of eastern Porirua residents rated their mental health as 'excellent', 'very good' or 'good', but this decreased slightly in all 8 cities and eastern Porirua between 2020 and 2022.


An increasing proportion of eastern Porirua residents said that over the past 12 months they frequently experienced stress, loneliness or isolation, resulting in a higher proportion of these experiences than the 8 cities in 2022 than in 2018.

### Mental and emotional health

"Kia ora E 6 au tamariki e noho ana ... Kei te tino mamae ahau i nga ahuatanga kino, he iti rawa te whare mo taku whanau, kei te pirangi au ki te awhina, tena koa. I tukuna he tono kia whakarereketia te whare 7 tau ki muri, a tae noa mai ki naianei karekau he tangata e awhina ana i ahau, ka tino pouri ahau. I have 6 children living with me ... I am in lots of pain, and it is affecting my spirit badly. The house is too small for my whānau. I need your help please. I put in application 7 years ago to change house. Still till now no one has come to help me. I am very sad" (Community Survey 2024).

"I feel like [young people drink] because there's no one to talk to .... Just the weekend gone, I had one of my cousins, she was just drinking because .... [s]he was just so upset about something, so she just chose alcohol because it was the only thing that could calm her down. And I feel like that's why some young people choose to do that, because it's the safest thing for them" (Rangatahi talanoa 2023).

"I also love the opportunities the community services have to offer eg health services, mental health help, food boxes for families struggling, programs for old people who are alone etc" (Community Survey 2024).

"The gap when the service is closed gives the kid the option to sit alone and when the kid is alone, everything just feels the heat .... that's when the bad decisions come out, like having to go through the streets to find something that will satisfy the needs of what the brain is actually telling the kid but which is not helpful and it's not healthy for the kid's mindset. It's like one thing leads to the other. Mental health, not as strong, it's very bad. It's only thinking about bad things and that results in doing drugs, alcohol, and that just becomes the addiction" (Rangatahi talanoa 2023).

# **Spiritual health**

Around *two-thirds of* eastern Porirua residents had at least one religious affiliation, *more* than New Zealanders overall. The level of affiliation also stayed *steady* at a time when religious affiliation declined across New Zealand.

Around *two-thirds of* eastern Porirua residents had at least one religious affiliation/belief, but a wide range of religious and spiritual denominations are supported in eastern Porirua, all at *higher* levels than for New Zealand generally.

Although adult full-time employment rates were *higher* in New Zealand than eastern Porirua in 2018, full-time employment rates *increased more* in eastern Porirua from 2013 to 2018.

Census data from both 2013 and 2018 showed that just *over one-third* of eastern Porirua residents were not in the labour force. The community survey in 2024 reported similar results, with absence from the labour force attributed to disability, injury or sickness, criminal record, personal/family care responsibilities, studies, retirement or other reasons.



Median incomes for eastern Porirua *increased* for all household types, except one-person households.


### Median personal income

"... what I don't like about Eastern Porirua would be the poverty. Essentially the number of begging in Cannons Creek. I feel obligated to give whatever change I have but it does put me off from wanting to shop there (in the Cannons Creek shopping area)" (Community Survey 2024).

"... what I said before about me wanting to leave, but always knowing my roots and representing where I came from. Hopefully when I do make it that big I would want to ... create a hub. Just as she did one for the community. I would want to do one for like the fashion community" (Rangatahi talanoa).

### **Business and economic development**

Just over half of all community survey participants 'strongly agreed' or 'agreed' that planned development in eastern Porirua would create jobs and improve the local economy.






### Work-life balance


#### Residents reporting satisfaction between work and other aspects of life



"...if I had gone to a different school other than Porirua College ... I wouldn't feel safe, I wouldn't feel as comfortable that whole time to complete my studies. Just because of the school and where it was. It was my people, that's how I felt. Fresh off the islands, not knowing what New Zealand is, but Porirua College showed me what's good, what it is to actually live the life and see the struggles in person. It makes me feel more empowered to strive for more in the future, to push for more, for the community. Yeah, it's a give and receive, coming from my age, this generation as well. So yeah, eastern Porirua for me is home. And it's so much more than just home, if that makes sense. It's everything for me" (Rangatahi talanoa).

"... when you move a school or you move the whānau away from a school, like when we were supposed to decanter the population down in Cannon's Creek and put it in a house around about six months away from your school, what is that going to do for the ability of that child to reconnect with other people they've never met?" (Pāhake talanoa).

# **Engagement and achievement**

Eastern Porirua residents were *less likely* to have a Level 5 or 6 diploma or higher than New Zealanders generally. However, the percentage of eastern Porirua residents with a Level 5 or 6 diploma or higher has *increased* since 2013.







"Change the name of my street please. Driver. HMS brought guns and cannons used in battle against my tupuna at Horokiri. Get rid of 'Cannons' too please. The Creek is Fine" (Community Survey 2024).

### I know and understand Ngāti Toa history in eastern Porirua





### The community works together on shared goals and issues





"I personally don't like the idea of how people are like, "Get out of here, get out of here." I'm like, "What's wrong with here?" Let's just say it this way, if we all start going one by one then what's left? Porirua will be nothing without the people. It's better to just stay here and do better for the community, other than going and do better to represent another community" (Rangatahi talanoa 2023).

At least *three-quarters* of eastern Porirua residents 'strongly agreed' or 'agreed' that a sense of community with people in their neighbourhood is important to them and *over half* felt a sense of community in their neighbourhood.


In both cases, residents in eastern Porirua were *slightly more likely* than those in the 8 QoL cities to agree, although such agreement was *decreasing*.

"Some of the people that we've seen [with a disability advocate they know], all they see is this man in a chair. They don't understand that this man had a life before that, and he was engaged, and he was working with the council and knows what he's talking about. But they just see this man in a chair and they're like, 'Oh, oh, oh.' But if you're going to make something accessible for someone with a disability, if it's in the community, don't go to someone in Wellington who's just studied disability and accessibility at university. Talk to someone who lives it on a day-to-day" (Whaikaha talanoa 2023).



Only a *quarter* of community survey participants said 'yes' they had participated in Te Rā Nui engagements, although almost a *third* were aware of Te Rā Nui Development plans. Over a *half* indicated 'not sure' to both questions, while a *minority* stated that had not participated in a Te Rā Nui engagement or were unaware of Te Rā Nui plans.

Around *two-fifths* of the community survey participants who were aware of Te Rā Nui plans agreed that Te Rā Nui was listening, their family was able to influence the future of eastern Porirua and that they had trust in Te Rā Nui partners. *Similar proportions* of survey participants were 'unsure', while a *minority* said 'no'.

You know, being able to just get out and visit someone that's locked in, or you know helping people wherever you know whether you do some community volunteer work or visit people shut in, or you know reaching out .... it gives you a sense of purpose ... doing something worthwhile, as well as giving back to your local community"




## **Social relationships**

A clear majority of eastern Porirua residents said that, if they faced a serious illness or injury or needed support during a difficult time, they would have someone to turn to support them.

"Porirua is like a family home-base kind of place. Like, people help one another, even if they don't know you, they always make you feel at home ... I think wherever you are in the community, I feel like anyone you see is considered family because it's a family home-base area. Everyone just helps one another" (Rangitahi talanoa 2023).

## **Social relationships**


Community survey participants reported a *high* level of manaakitanga within eastern Porirua, with many hosting and helping others at least once a month through reciprocal relationships.

It is not surprising, then, that over *three quarters* of participants said they 'strongly agreed' or 'agreed' that there is a culture of caring and giving for others and the environment in eastern Porirua, with only around a *quarter* being 'unsure' or disagreeing with this question.



"I have lived in Porirua since I was a baby. I have seen a lot of changes mostly positive. The diversity of Porirua has increased dramatically. It's lovely to see the different cultures here now. I have also through Facebook page seen a great deal of kindness and generosity from all kinds of people" (Community Survey 2024).

## **Appreciation of diversity**

In the past three months, a *minority* of eastern Porirua residents said they had personally experienced prejudice or intolerance in Porirua, or had been treated unfairly or excluded, because of their ethnicity, physical/mental condition or impairment, age, sexual orientation, religious beliefs or gender. Around a *third* had witnessed similar prejudice or intolerance against others.

In both cases, ethnicity was the most common basis for such exclusionary treatment, although this *decreased* between 2020 and 2022. However, exclusionary treatment of those with a physical/mental health condition or impairment increased both for personal experiences and witnessing others being excluded in this way.




"Basically it's [eastern Porirua] a place to crash between working hours.
The community, shops, etc doesn't really appeal. Being LGBT in a community with obvious gang activity doesn't encourage us to get out a lot" (Community Survey 2024).

## **Appreciation of diversity**

At least half of all residents thought that racism or discrimination towards particular groups of people had been a 'big' or a 'bit' of a problem in their city over the past 12 months.

"My whole family live here, my church is here. They say, where are you from? I say Porirua. They say what? I say P-town and the features of their faces pull down and suddenly my face becomes a town" (Community Survey 2024).

"... [teachers are] full of stereotypes as well, that they avoid giving attention to the brown people, due to the way brown people learn. And more attention to the other learners .... I was always with white kids in class, so I was always sort of left out by the teacher. Just because of the way I process things was different to the way white kids did" (Rangitahi talanoa 2023).

"... some teachers can't be bothered learning to pronounce [Pacific names] ... they can't be bothered learning about the culture and stuff like that ... Just helps show that you actually care about the person that's in front of you. Helps build a good rapport. Because yeah, our names hold a lot to it, holds a lot of our identity, so I think if you're willing to take the time to, the small things if you really take time, it kind of says to us 'okay, we should give you time. Because if you're not even gonna give us, like the time to get our names right then, why should we give you the time of day?' ... I think it's embarrassing for some people too. Like say at assemblies or like prize giving, and they read your name wrong and then people are just laughing in the crowd. It's not really the best" (Rangatahi talanoa 2023).

Nearly all community survey participants indicated that it is important to protect the natural environment in eastern Porirua. Further survey responses suggest that connections to the natural environment were important to a majority of families in eastern Porirua. However, only about one-third of participants had participated in an activity that protects the natural environment.





"I love the parks, natural spaces of our area and enjoy walks in the bush, beside streams, up hills, etc., especially in Cannons Creek Reserve and in Bothamley Park (when we lived near it). Our son used to go to Windley School and it was a great place to meet parents and watch cultural events. Our son played soccer at a park for a local football club and we enjoyed meeting other parents and cheering our boys on. We attend a local church and enjoy the social and spiritual connections we have with others in our community. I sometimes volunteer for cleanups at either park above and attend any event connected them" (Community Survey 2024).

"I don't like that there are fewer mature trees in Porirua East. When viewed from above it's obvious how bare Waitangirua looks in comparison to Whitby or even Ascot Park. Our streets look bare and much uglier" (Community Survey 2024).

A *clear majority* of residents were 'very satisfied' or 'satisfied' with beaches. However, satisfaction has generally decreased since 2016.

#### Satisfaction with beaches



"Parks are ok, and I've seen them well used. If we had more community gardens, could the outcome be, selling overstock of produce at markets to make more available to the community ... Better care of Aotea Lagoon. eg., better design layout of the rose garden, people still like to go there for photo opportunities" (Community Survey 2024).


#### Satisfaction with health of Porirua Harbour



#### Resident concerns with impact of climate change





"There is a leak on my street. I have lived there for 7 years and it has not been fixed" (Community Survey 2024). "The creek pond needs major maintenance and upgrade to allow families and local schools to enjoy the pond/park. Feel this will boost the creek side. Surrounding buildings in the creek need a lot of work alongside many parks that need better playgrounds for our children. Keen to learn more where we can help and volunteer for our community" (Community Survey 2024).

"It would be nice to have more parks to rest at for elderly - walk paths with trees, seats, chess tables, Tai Chi or something ... for children parks together because many of us elderly look after our moko now because daycare is too expensive" (Community Survey 2024).

## Built

A majority of community survey participants rated amenities in eastern Porirua as very good, good or OK, with ratings particularly high for local shops and supermarkets.





For most age groups over a 5-year period, a lower proportion of eastern Porirua residents than New Zealanders were discharged from publicly-funded hospitals where the external cuase of unintentional injury was an accident. Eastern Porirua residents had *slightly lower* rates than New Zealanders in general only for the age range of 60-74.

"I find it quite easy to travel around in my powerchair. Would be good if footpath access was better. Also using crossings can be tricky to access. Some areas have a path to use when crossing a road but have no rump to use. Glass is an issue when broken on the footpath" (Community Survey 2024).

"I don't like the potholes. I think they should get fixed" (Community Survey 2024).

Publicly-funded hospital discharges where the external cause of unintentional injury was an accident, per 1000 people, 2017-2022





"There is so much potential for Porirua to be better. I would love for my children to grow up in a place that they are proud to promote. It's the few bad eggs that give our place a bad reputation but I see the change happening" (Community Survey 2024).

"There needs to be more housing and policing around d the antisocial behaviour in the area. The streets need cleaning more than once a year and more lighting on the paths to help with personal safety" (Community Survey 2024).

## Thinking about eastern Porirua, how much do you agree or disagree, crime is a concern near my home?




#### Feelings of safety in home after dark











#### Public transport use on weekly basis





#### **Public transport is safe**











#### Traffic

Eastern Porirua residents were discharged from publicly-funded hospitals where the external cause of injury was a motor vehicle traffic accident at a *very similar* rate to other New Zealanders over a 5-year period, except for eastern Porirua residents aged 75+ who were *slightly less* likely to be hospitalised for this reason.

Publicly-funded hospital discharges where the external cause of injury is a motor vehicle traffic accident, per 1000 people, 2017-2022



#### Dangerous driving is problem





#### **Traffic**

Traffic congestion was considered a 'big' or a 'bit' of a problem by a *majority* of all residents, although *slightly less* so in eastern Porirua than other 8 QoL cities.

"The crazy noisy cars driving around my street, and I suggest, putting up some road safety humps will ease that problem, it's for the sake of little children and the elderly as well" (Community Survey 2024).


"Place just feels grotty.

## **Parking**

Residents in eastern Porirua are less likely than in other 8 QoL cities to consider limited parking in the city centre/local area a 'big' or a 'bit' of a problem.


